

OVER IN CAMDEN

* Frank Drake, 20 years old, of 765 Spruce street, has been missing since Wednesday last.

* A slight fire occurred yesterday at William Stevens' stationary store, at 333 Kaighn avenue.

* Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday in the County Clerk's office by the Sons of Abraham, a Hebrew benevolent society.

* The Americus Club has adopted appropriate resolutions on the death of ex-Assemblyman Frederick Bourquin.

* It is stated that the Pennsylvania Railroad Company has completed the purchase of land for the construction of a belt line along Camden's water front.

* John Widener, who has been living a hermit's life in an abandoned street car on Van Buren street, was removed to the Blackwood almshouse yesterday.

* A dog, supposed to be mad, ran amuck in South Camden yesterday, and after having two bullets fired into his body was finally beaten to death with clubs.

* Policeman William Schregler, who was shot by the Collingswood postoffice burglars about ten days ago, has recovered sufficiently to leave the Cooper Hospital.

* While excursionists of the Tabernacle M. E. Church were returning from Lakeside Park a vandal entered the baggage car and cut the tires on fourteen bicycles.

* Judge Miller reserved decision yesterday in the suit of Josephine Wills against Hannah Brown to recover \$1200 for taking care of the defendant, who is an invalid.

* Nearly 100 employees of the Camden and Suburban Railway participated yesterday in a distribution of \$1000 for good conduct and obedience to the rules of the company during the past six months.

* A Mrs. Harris, of 629 Grant street, purchased eight cents' worth of truck from two hucksters yesterday, and gave them a \$3 bill in payment. They went around the corner after change, and did not return. Frank Carman and John Kearney were arrested, and are locked up awaiting a hearing.

* A young man, about 20 years of age, passed an alleged bogus check for \$10 on Wilson & Co., coal dealers, of Second and Chestnut streets, yesterday. He offered the check in payment for a ton of coal, and received \$5.50 in change. The check was drawn by "F. V. Voorhees" to the order of "William Reed."

* The body of an unknown man, with his head crushed and several ribs broken, was found yesterday along the tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad, near Beldeman Station. The body was removed to the Morgue. The dead man was about 55 years old, 5 feet 6 inches in height, and weighed about 135 pounds.
