

LEFT LOCOMOTIVE AND DISAPPEARED

Driver Abandoned His Engine at
Tuckahoe, Turned Up in Cam-
den, Then Dropped Out of Sight

TUCKAHOE, N. J., May 27.—Ocea Dolan, of 1639 South Sixth street, Camden, an engineer on the Atlantic City Railroad, disappeared from a locomotive on the siding here last night. The fireman, William Bradley, after waiting some time, wired the Camden office, and an extra crew was sent to take the engine to that city. In the meantime a posse was formed to hunt for Dolan, but after several hours' fruitless search, it was abandoned.

The missing man was one of the best-known engineers on the road and possessed considerable means.

Came Home and Disappeared

At the office of the railroad company in Camden yesterday it was stated that Dolan and Bradley were bringing a light engine up from Cape May and that while waiting on a siding at Tuckahoe for an express train to pass, Dolan disappeared. It was also stated that Dolan had been employed by the company for twenty years, had an excellent record and it could not be understood why he should abandon the engine. At Dolan's boarding house it was stated that he arrived home early yesterday morning and after washing and changing his clothing he left the house, saying he was going to Philadelphia.
