Westmont Legion to Receive Colors This Afternoon

WESTMONT, N. J., May 8.—A stand of colors will be presented to Alle I. Morgan Post, No. 230, American Legion, in the Fire Hall, Sunday afternoon at four o'clock. Commander John H. Dittess will receive the flags on behalf of the post.

Word that the body of the late Allen I. Morgan, the only Haddon township boy who was buried in France, would be shipped from Hoboken early this morning has been received, but the notice was so late that the elaborate ceremonies planned for the military funeral have been postponed until next week.
