

OVER IN CAMDEN

Policeman John Zane, of the East Side, yesterday shot a mad dog at Eighteenth and Federal streets. Several persons narrowly escaped being bitten by the animal.

Mrs. Katie Herman, aged 23 years, of 301 Line street, was walking up the wooden steps in front of her home yesterday, when the top step gave way and threw her to the ground, inflicting severe injuries to her hip. She was taken to Cooper Hospital.

Early yesterday morning Captain Stanley, Sergeant Hyde and five policemen raided the alleged disorderly house of James Painter, known as "Butler Hall," at 712 Sycamore street. Besides Painter three colored women, one colored man, one white woman and one white man were arrested. They will be given a hearing before Recorder Nowrey to-day.
