

OVER IN CAMDEN

Receiver Nowery, of Camden, yesterday fined John W. Parson, of Stockton for riding a bicycle on the sidewalk.

The receipts of the Camden Water Department for the past month were \$10,111.12, an increase over previous months.

The scholars of the Tabernacle Baptist Church have arranged for a flag raising on the church lawn on a date yet to be fixed.

John Messick, of Paronia, who was injured on Decoration Day by the premature discharge of a cannon, died at the Cooper Hospital yesterday.
