Victim Unconscious in Hospital at Camden-Four Arrests Are Made for Speeding

Efforts are being made by Prosecutor Kraft to learn the identity of the autoist who ran down Ralph Gegamaldo, aged 64, of Wilmington, Del., while he was walk-

ing along the White Horse pike Saturday night. He is in Cooper Hospital, Camden, with a probable fracture of the skull and up to last night he had not recovered consciousness. Gegamaldo was walking from Atco to Waterford, twenty miles below Camden, when the machine ran into him. The car never stopped. The police at Hammonton, Egg Harbor and other places were asked to be on the lookout. In connection with the case of Harry Thompson, aged 50, who was killed at Mt. Ephraim Saturday night, Prosecutor Kraft stated an inquiry conducted by him showed it was an accident. In the machine were John Harned, Jr. and Herbert Bradley, who were operating the

car at a very moderate rate when Thompson apparently walked into it. Owing to his detective force being hard at work on the Cord murder mystery, Mr. Kraft was unable to carry out his plan to have the White Horse pike patrolled. Constables were out, however, and in Camden city four arrests for speeding were made by Motor-cycle Policeman Frost. They included Charles Bell, 33, of 139 S. North Carolina avenue.
