Knights of the Golden Eagle.

The annual session of the Grand Castle, Knights of the Golden Eagle, was held in Bridgeton last Tuesday. Past Chief Pettit, of Camden, presided until the installation in the afternoon, when Grand Chief Wm. W. Hewitt, of Bridgeton, occupied the chair. About 200 Past Chiefs were present. The reports showed that there were 41 castles in the State, with a membership of 4,189; 357 sick members had been relieved during the year; there had been 20 deaths, and 757 persons had been initiated during the year. In the evening there was a parade with over 500 Knights in line. Lieutenant General Louis E. Stolz, of Philadelphia, with his staff, was present. The town was generally illuminated. The following are the new officers: Past Grand Chief, H. Frank Pettit, Camden; Grand Chief, William N. Hewitt, Bridgeton; Grand Vice Chief, George L. Frazee, Camden; Grand High Priest, Dr. H. A. Bennett, Point Pleasant; Grand Master of Records, E. D. Senseman, Camden; Grand Keeper or Exchequer, F. A. Buren, Merchantville; Grand Sir Herald, F. Wayland Potter, Camden; Grand First Guardsman, George Wimer, Palmyra; Grand Second Guardsman, Edward F. Bacon, Salem. Trenton was decided upon as the place of the next annual meeting.

NEWARK, N. J., Aug. 26, 1889.

General Order No. 2:

I. The annual parade of the First regiment, U. R., K. of P., will take place in the city of Trenton on Monday, September 23, 1889.

II. Headquarters will be established at the Hotel Clinton, where commandants of divisions will report to the Adjutant on arrival.

VI. Refreshments will be served immediately upon dismissal of parade.
