

CAMDEN NEWS-NOTES

** Vice Chancellor Leaming yesterday granted a rule to show cause why the Young Amusement Company should not be restrained from encroaching on the property of Thomas Pres, at Atlantic City.

** Saturday, May 15, will be known as Tag Day in Camden, when an effort will be made to raise a substantial fund for the Homeopathic Hospital, one of the worthiest institutions in the city.

** After an investigation by Detective Brothers the police have learned that the note left by two young women last Saturday, in which they hinted at suicide, was a joke. Both have returned home.

** Vice Chancellor Leaming, in Camden yesterday, allowed a counsel fee in the case of Mrs. Anna Mason, who is suing her husband, Charles Mason, for divorce. The matter of alimony was adjourned until the case comes to a final hearing.

** Early in July Rev. Dr. Holmes F. Gravatt, pastor of the First M. E. Church, Camden, will leave for a two months' trip to Europe.
