* The Flemington Board of Trade elected the following officers at their annual meeting yesterday. President, John B. Case; vice president, Dr. William W. Hawke, treasurer, Albert H. Hittenhouse; secretary, James E. Farmer.

* Burglars entered the mill of George C. Higgins & Son, at Three Bridges. The safe was broken open, but the cash had been removed and the thieves secured nothing.

* At the next meeting of Gloucester City Council James E. Murphy, who keeps a saloon at King street and Broadway, will ask that his license be transferred to Alfred L. Shank. Edward Penn will ask that his license be transferred to Jacob Roden.

* Cloud Lodge of Maçons yesterday attended the funeral and conducted the services over the body of Lemuel Dutton at Gloucester City. Interment was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

* About \$40,000 worth of operations have been given to Woodbury contractors for houses in that city, work to begin at once.
