LIQUOR MEN FEAR

CONGRESS LIKELY TO PASS A LAW TO RESTRICT SHIPMENT OF INTOXICANTS.

WOULD PROTECT DRY STATES

Kenyon Bill in Senate or Webb Bill in House Will Settle a Question That Has Vexed the Lawmakers Many Years.

Washington.—After nearly 15 years of agitation on the subject the senate is about to vote on a bill whose aim is to prevent the shipment of liquors by means of interstate commerce into states where the sale of liquor is forbidden. It is expected that the senate will pass the measure, but whether it passes it or not, the house may consider a bill to the same end on its own account, and send it for sanction over to the senate, which, failing to accept its own measure, may be kindly inclined toward that of the house. From a period away back in the McKinley administration bills to effect the object of the one which is now about to come to a vote have been the subject of bitter debate, or strenuous advocacy, and of opposition just as strenuous. The opposing forces say that the bill will cut the profits of breweries and distilleries of the country more than one-half, and that thousands of persons will be thrown out of employment. Further, they claim that the measure takes away from a man a part of his personal liberty, and that it is close to the line of being unconstitutional.

The friends of the bill say its results simply will be to confine the beer of the breweries and the liquor of the distilleries to the field where their sale is legal, and that it will not interfere with the personal rights of any man, or woman in any state of the Union. In addition to this, the proponents of the bill say it will promote temperance, and make easier the enforcement of laws in the states which have the word "dry" written into their constitutions.

Two Bills Much Alike.

There are two bills in congress for the accomplishment of the purpose which the proponents have in view. One is the bill of Senator Kenyon of Iowa and the other that of Representative Webb of North Carolina. So it will be seen that the measure has the advantage of both Republican and Democratic parentage. The two bills are very much alike, and either will accomplish the purpose intended.

The senate is about to vote on the Kenyon bill, and it is said it will be sanctioned. The measure will then go to the house, but by the time it reaches there it seems likely that the Webb bill will have been reported favorably from the committee on judiciary, and it is possible the house, if it intends to approve the legislation, will suggest that the Webb measure be substituted for the Kenyon measure. If the Webb bill is substituted by the house it is likely the senate will accept it after a conference, and so it seems probably that Mr. Taft will be given an opportunity to sign or veto a measure which has been vexing congresses and administrations for a long time.

The title of the Kenyon bill is "To Prohibit Interstate Commerce in Intoxicating Liquors in Certain Cases." The title of the Webb bill is "To Prohibit Interstate Commerce of Their Interstate Commerce Character in Certain Cases." Each bill forbids the shipment or transportation of intoxicating liquors of any kind into prohibition territory if it is to be used in violation of the law of the state into which it is imported. This will make the police power of a state in liquor shipment matters superior to the law governing interstate commerce in non-prohibited goods.

Opponents See No Hope.

Opponents of the measure, who hold that it interferes with personal liberty and that it will throw thousands of persons out of employment, have taken a poll of the house committee on judiciary, and they say they fear that the Webb bill will be reported favorably. They also have found out the sentiment in the house proper, and they say that this bill, whether in the Kenyon form or in the Webb form, is certain to be passed by the representatives by an overwhelming majority. The opponents of the measure are in the belief that the house members will not dare to vote against it, and this, feeling as they do, they hold it a symptom of moral cowardice.

One does not have to go far to look for the reason for the Kenyon and the Webb bills. The friends of both measures say that because of the inviolability of interstate commerce, large quantities of liquor are shipped into prohibition states to be sold secretly contrary to the laws of the states. If it had been possible to tell what man intended to use the liquor for his table, and what man intended to use it for pecuniary profit, this law would never have come up to trouble the brewers and to threaten the existence of great industries. It has been before congress after congress. The outlook is that sooner or later it will pass. It will take about a year, perhaps, to show whether this bill decreases the manufacture and the consumption of liquor, and the same time will avail to show whether or not the brewers must discharge men by the wholesale because of diminishing production and diminishing profits.

CAMDEN SLAYER ELECTROCUTED

Charles Ford, of Camden, who killed his common law wife, Mrs. Effie Wagner, last March, when he followed her to Laurel Springs, was electrocuted in Trenton last evening.

Ford had been drinking heavily and his common law wife, with whom he had lived for 12 years, went to Laurel Springs. He met Robert Wilson coming from the house and shot him. Then he shot and killed the woman and finally put a bullet into his body. Wilson and he survived the attempted homicide and suicide and entirely recovered. Ford met his death bravely.

WORKMAN SERIOUSLY BURNED

John Chard, of Millville, is confined in a hospital at Baltimore, Md., as a result of having a gathering of molten glass dropped upon him by his gatherer. His condition is said to be serious.

Chard is a machine workman and has been working with Walter Robinson, also of Millville, in Baltimore, his fire. The injury which befell Chard resulted purely by accident. The gatherer had just brought out a large lump of molten glass from the tank and in swinging it around struck Chard, who had stepped over behind the gatherer and was out of his accustomed place at the time. Having his head turned he did not see the impending nature and neither did the gatherer see Chard.

The gathering struck Chard full in the abdomen. A patch of flesh almost a foot square was taken off, the glass burning to the bone. The young man was immediately taken to a hospital and every effort is being made to save his life.—Glassworker.
