

OVER IN CAMDEN

Sadie Conway, 49 years old, of Atlantic City, was admitted to Cooper Hospital yesterday, suffering with a dislocated shoulder.

Thirteen glazers at the Quaker City Morocco Works went on a strike yesterday because five of their number were discharged.

Mrs. Mary Bass, of 323 North Eleventh street, was found dead in bed yesterday. Coroner Robinson gave a certificate of death from heart disease.

Incorporation articles were filed yesterday by the Hull Umbrella Manufacturing Company, with a capital stock of \$150,000, of which \$2100 is paid in.

Charles Croff, 18 years old, of 331 Spruce street, was injured internally yesterday by falling from the hay loft of a stable. His condition is serious.

Dempsey Butler, said to be the wealthiest colored person in Camden, was stricken with paralysis on Saturday, and is in a critical condition.

Recognition services for the new pastor, Rev. Dr. Quinton C. Davis, were held last evening in Emmanuel Baptist Church. Many former pastors participated.

Mrs. Mary McEntee was held in \$500 bail by Justice Stackhouse, charged with keeping a disorderly house at 3 James court, raided by the police on Sunday.

There was an unusually large attendance of pupils at the High School yesterday when Professor Bryan assumed charge as principal, succeeding Professor Schrieber.

Census Supervisor John Blowe yesterday appointed as his chief clerk Professor Horatio Draper, former supervising principal of the Camden public schools.

James Neal, 18 years old, was held in \$300 bail yesterday by Recorder Nowrey, charged with breaking into the second hand store of Michael Dohan, on Kaighn avenue.

Justice Baldwin yesterday issued a warrant for Thomas Ward, who is said to have kidnapped his child on Saturday last while Recorder Nowrey was waiting for him to appear for sentence on a charge of non-support.

There was but one case of typhoid fever reported to the Board of Health during the month ending yesterday. Other contagious disease cases reported were as follows: Diphtheria, 13; membranous croup, 6; scarlet fever, 8.

The grand jury yesterday continued the investigation of charges of Sunday liquor selling against Camden saloon keepers. The grand jury will visit the county institutions at Blackwood to-day, but will not conclude its labors for about two weeks.
