

OVER THE RIVER.

THE COURTS—In the District Court of Camden, Judge Miller presiding, yesterday, the following cases were disposed of: James McLoughlin vs. Dempsey Butler, debt. The case was adjourned for one week; Coltrell vs. Edmund J. Butcher, debt. Verdict for plaintiff, \$32 85; Michael Coltrell vs. William Small, debt. Verdict for plaintiff, \$21; Samuel K. Hires vs. John Darragh. Verdict for plaintiff, \$60 23; Meyer Bissenger vs. Owen R. Jones, debt. Judgment in favor of plaintiff, \$39 80. The General Quarter Sessions commence the May term this morning.

CITY HALL INVESTIGATION—A writ of quo warranto was yesterday served on Mr. Samuel Hasty, the expert accountant employed by the Finance Committee of City Council, commanding him to appear to day before the Chancellor, at Trenton, to show cause why he had not delivered to Alfred Hugg, solicitor, the books and papers taken from his office a week ago as commanded by a previous injunction. This is the only new phase in the imbroglio at the Camden City Hall incident to the investigation of the accounts in the different departments now going on.

NEW RAILWAY AT CAPE MAY—There is a proposition now under serious consideration by capitalists for a new passenger railway, to connect at Sea Grove with Cape May city. The road is to be run on the inside of "Beach Drive," in case the city will grant a right of way within the city limits to the Stockton Hotel, and thence to all the principal hotels, and around the city generally.

FELL FROM A WINDOW.—A son of Mr. N. S. E. Cowperthwait, aged about seven years, fell from a window of the third story of his father's residence, No. 221 Federal street, Camden, on Saturday afternoon, and was severely injured. His injuries are not, however, considered fatal.

TAKEN TO TRENTON.—Yesterday morning Sheriff Daubman conveyed to the State prison, at Trenton, three colored men who had been sentenced to that institution at the last term of court, one for eighteen months, one for one year and one for seven months.

MASONS.—Last evening the Merchantville Lodge, of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, visited Franklin Lodge, of Philadelphia. This lodge is in a prosperous condition.
