The house where old Mrs. Zane, her daughter and her grandson lived is an old-fashloned, three-story frame dwelling, severely plain in front, its rooms small, with low ceilings, the hallways rather narrow and the stairways steep. There is a side alley, and a good sized yard in the rear Mrs. Zane owned the house and had lived there many years. Her hushand, formerly a sea captain, died about two years ago. The house is filled with old-fashioned, cominted with old-rashioned, com-fortable furniture, but contained noth-ing which would be likely to excite the cupidity of the ordinary house-

breaker.

Seeing that the old lady was beyond help, the search was continued. Directly back of the room occupied by Mrs. Zane is an unused bed room, which is opposite the head of the stairs. Blood was dripping from a bullet wound on the right side of her head, and had formed a pool on the carpet. Mrs. Shaw was still alive, but unconscious. Her tongue was protruding and she was gasping for breath. Tenand she was gasping for breath. Tenderly the policeman and the two neighbors raised her to a more comfortable position. The hallway runs back alongside of the second-story runs back alongside of the second-story back room to the bathroom, which is a small addition recently built to the rear of the house. The door to the second-story back room opens on the hallway at the extreme southern end of the room and the stairs that lead to the first floor are directly opposite.

ed through this hole to turn the catch,
There was still another door to be opened before entrance could be gained to the dining-room. This door was bolted, the dining-room. This door was boited, and the catch which held the end of the boil was forced off, apparently by pressure against the door. From this room the stairs ascend to the second floor, Some silverware was found wrapped in the cable. Whether it was a napkin on the table. Whether it was a napkin on the table. The burglar apparently made his es-cape by running out the back door, Icaping a low fence into an adjoining yard and then gaining an alley leading into Pine street directly in the rear. The no-lice are puzzled over the failure to discover any trace of the burglar or to find anyone who saw him, as several of the neighbors were astir at that hour.
