Firemen and Citizens Fight Blaze, Result of Which Aggravates Over-Crowded Condition of Rooms

The overcrowded condition of Carnden's schools was made worse yesterday by the Kaighn School, at Newton avenue and Sycamore street, being hadly damaged by fire. It will be several weeks at least before the building can again be used for school purposes.

The fire was discovered shortly after 1 o'clock in the afternoon. Smoke was pouring from the windows in thick vol-umes. When the bremen arrived the interior of the building on the northeast end was ablaze. Scores of citizens assisted the firemen in their work and materrally aided in saving the school from

total destruction. The flames ate their way through the partitions and such thick smoke arose from the fat pine flooring that the firemen were almost overcome. After a strenuous hour fremen and citizens succeeded in extinguishing the flames.

Janitor John Campbell said the fire originated in the northeastern section of the cellar, where there was an old heater, the top of which was but a few
