The engine struck the front of the car with terrific force, upsetting the apparatus and hurling both men to the street, where they lay senseless and bleeding. As far as doctors at Homeorathic Hospital have been able to discover, no bones were broken, but each of the victims has many lacerations and appears to be burr in-

ternally. None of the passengers on the car was hurt, and the motorman saved himself by jumping. Both engine and car were badly damaged. Weston is 50 years old and lives at 3510 Federal street. Victers is 45 and resides at 15 North Twenty-
