

DROWNED IN COOPER'S CREEK.

An Unknown German Loses His Life While Bathing—Camden Notes.

Yesterday afternoon three Germans rowed up Cooper's creek to West Collingswood. According to the account given to Coroner Henry by Arthur Boigte, a boy, two of the men got out of the boat and left the third one. The two men had hardly disappeared when the third one took off his clothing and went in to bathe. He had only got a few yards from shore when he sank and was drowned.

The man's companions have not yet notified the authorities of their companion's death. The drowned man's clothing consisted of a blue sack coat and plaid pants and shirt. In one pocket was found a silver dollar, in another an open-face silver watch and a chain with a broken charm attached. A tobacco bag with the name of "William H. Schuster, northwest corner of Tenth and Ridge avenue" was also found.

MANIA FOR ASSAULTING WOMEN.

While Miss Lillie Miller, of North Camden, was on her way home on Saturday night, she was assaulted by an unknown man, who struck her several times and then ran. Miss Miller gave Policeman Cable, of the First ward, a description of the man, and the latter subsequently saw a well dressed man acting suspiciously around Front and Market streets. The officer had been watching the man a few minutes when a lady, named Mrs. Frank O'Neil, came along. The man stepped out from behind a tree box and dealt her two terrific blows in the face. Officer Cable captured the man and took him to the City Hall. He proved to be Frank Humphreys, a clerk. He will have a hearing to-day.
