

CAMDEN NOTES

** The Women's Park Association will give its second outing to the poor children of the city to Knight Park to morrow.

** The felt weavers at the Fries-Breslin rug mills who were thrown out of work by the strike of the rug weavers, now declare they will not go back. The mills are still practically closed.

** David Green, wanted on the charge of murderously attacking Benjamin Cholister, at Ellensburg, was brought from Philadelphia to Camden yesterday on requisition papers.

** The Camden police have been asked to locate George Milburn, 47 years old, of 1903 South Twelfth street, Philadelphia who left his home Monday for Merchantville. At the time he had \$200 with him. Foul play is feared.

** H. G. Benson, a lineman in the employ of the Bell Telephone Company, was arrested in Camden yesterday by Policeman Lovett, charged with the larceny of leaden sleeves from the company. He protested his innocence, but Detective Painter, it is said, on searching the home of Benson, at 220 Cole street, found the stolen articles beneath a couch.

** Work was begun yesterday on the demolition of the Carman mansion, a landmark of Camden, for three-quarters of a century. A modern department store will be erected on the site by George A. Munger. The old building was erected in 1830 by William Carman. It was in this house that D. Cooper Carman, one of the most popular city clerks of Camden, suddenly died. The Carmans were among the substantial promoters of the city in its early history.
