

DOINGS IN CAMDEN

** Court Officer Frederick Volght yesterday went to West Rutland, Vt., to bring back on requisition papers James Miller, who is wanted on the charge of deserting his wife, Mary Miller.

** Several hundred schoolma'ns from South Jersey attended the annual Teachers' Institute at the High School yesterday. The session will continue today.

** The Public Service Company was incorporated yesterday, with a capital of \$800,000, the subscribers being William J. Henderson, Walter P. Bishop and M. Stat-hart, Jr.

** The Fireside New Year's Association will meet tonight to decide whether it will make its usual annual display on New Year's Day.

** The ninth anniversary of the Stockton Quartet Club, of East Camden, will be celebrated in a fitting manner next Monday night.

** Judge Endicott yesterday declared his intention of clearing up the Circuit Court calendar. Beginning with next Monday he will hold court for two weeks.

** It is the intention of the authorities to clean out the many disorderly houses that have located within the past year in and about Kaighn's Point.

** Since it has been rumored that Harry Kramer, the present City Clerk, is not to succeed himself, there has been much wire-pulling by would-be successors.

** The several Courts of Foresters of America from South Jersey will pay a fraternal visit to Court Pride, of Stockton, No. 13, of East Camden, tomorrow night.

** A team belonging to Henry Montane, of Maple Shade, was struck by a trolley car at Thirty-second and Federal streets last night. The wagon was damaged and Charles Danbert, the driver, was injured, but not seriously.

** After thirty years the Court of Chancery held its last session in the old building at 106 Market street yesterday. It was announced that Chancellor Magie had issued an order for the removal of the court to its new quarters in the new court house.

** Deciding not to face the police committee on several charges, Policeman Isaac Lovett, in Camden, yesterday tendered his resignation to Mayor Ellis. Lovett was to have been given a hearing tonight.

** Since Camden voted favorably to having established a municipal lighting plant Mayor Ellis has been in receipt of communications from all parts of the country from persons desirous of helping the city in locating a suitable site, preparing plans, building the plant, procuring experts, and, in fact, constructing the proposed plant from start to finish.

** While handling a revolver yesterday the weapon suddenly exploded and badly tore the hand of George E. Smith, 36 years old, of 644 North Eighth street. It was another case of "not knowing it was loaded."

** While Mrs. Mary Clark, who keeps a small store at Cooper and Ambler streets, was in the rear part of her home yesterday a sneak thief entered the place and stole from the drawer \$12 in money.

** Contractors at work on the temporary bridge across the Cooper Creek at Federal street say they will have the structure in readiness for traffic by January. As soon as this bridge is completed work will at once be begun on the \$80,000 structure for which the suburbanites have been asking for several years.
