The matter under discussion this morning was whether or not there should be a per capita tax for the maintenance of the Benevolent Fund and for general expenses. At the present time the benevolent fund is maintained by assessments and while there is a faction of the association clamoring for the per capita tax as the only sure method of maintaining the Benevolent Fund, there is a large following of the present plan of assessments. No action has been taken this morning.

The time of the convention this afternoon will be taken up with a discussion on the project to agitate one day off duty in six instead of the present plan of one day off in eight. The firemen believe that it is possible to grant this request without crippling the departments at any time. They are contined in the fire houses now for seven loars, night and day, except for meal hours, and the firemen find the close work very trying.
