WITH DOG AND GUN

Burlington, Nov. 16.—Having read of the luck of gunners who have been scouting the woods and fields in this vicinity, William Lawton of Mercer Street, E. H. Carpenter and G. W. Crompton of South Broad Street, and William Felt of Lambertson Street, Trenton, came this week Thursday evening. They took home a large bundle of game and are now treating their friends to quail, pheasant, rabbits and woodcock.

The Trenton party went to Indian Mills on the first day of the gunning season in an automobile and expected to return home in the same manner, but the car did not show up so they were obliged to lay over.

Thursday they arrived in this city with a large box of game and were the centre of admiration. In all there were forty rabbits, four pheasants, four woodcock and three quail.

Harvey Austin, operator at the P. R. R. station, this city, with several of his companions, were at Rancocas Thursday for game, but to their dismay did not even see a rabbit.

While it was a question whether or not they should kill their dog in order to shoot some result of their day's gunning trip.
