

CAMDEN NEWS NOTES

** In falling out of bed, 18-months-old Philip Kieran, of 244-Lake street, so badly hit his tongue that he had to be taken to the Homeopathic Hospital for treatment.

** Some months ago Fireman William Miller, of No. 3 Engine House, badly injured his hip at a fire at Bennett's lumber yard. Yesterday it was necessary for him to go to the Jefferson Hospital.

** Half the companies of the city turned out to a false alarm sent in yesterday from Ninth and Linden streets, apparently by someone in a spirit of peculiar "fun."

** The funeral of Mrs. Jennie Chew, wife of William W. Chew, a life-long resident of the southern section of the city, took place yesterday from her home, at 926 South Fifth street, interment being made in the Harleigh Cemetery.

** 12-year-old Frank Moffa, of Third and Division streets, accused of stealing eggs, told Recorder Stackhouse yesterday that he did so because he wanted to get an Easter suit of clothes. He was turned over to Probation Officer White.
