

WANT TO KNOW WHAT ELECTION LAW MEANS

Camden City Clerk Rejects Nomination Petitions in Order to Determine New Primary Methods

In order to ascertain just what the new primary election law means with reference to filing nomination petitions, City Clerk Bradley, in Camden yesterday, rejected the petitions filed by Alfred L. Sayre, secretary of the Camden County Republican Executive Committee. This action was taken on the ground that the petitions contained the names of nominees for the County Committee from each of the precincts, Clerk Bradley declaring the law, as interpreted by him, provides for but one member from each ward.

In consequence of this it was announced that Chairman Harry Reeves, of the County Committee, will mandamus the action of the City Clerk in order to have the court definitely decide which method is legal.
