Inspection **Bill Aims** At Rejects

A bill requiring special treatment for motorists when they bring back their rejected autos for reinspection scheduled for a vote in the State Senate today.

The measure has been offered as a way to reduce the lines at inspection stations, but Motor Vehicle Director Ronald Heyman is skeptical. In fact. Heymann opposes the bill on grounds that it probably would have the opposite result and would result in

"staggering" cost. Study Under Way Moreover, the new director notes that a comprehensive study is being made of the inspection system and he questions whether changes should be made until it is finished.

The bill says the director must provide for reinspection "at such time or in such manner without the necessity of waiting in line with vehicles not being presented for reinspection.

This would mean the designation of separate lanes or Tried Before

A legislative commission proposed reinspection lanes five years ago, and the division experimented with them for six months and concluded the experiment was unsuccessful.

The experiment showed there weren't enough rejected vehicles to justify separate lanes and that there was a problem segregating the firsttime vehicles from those being reinspected.

Heymann said there are only 71 lanes at the 40 stations and that most of them are fully used.

The bill is sponsored by Belli, in an exchange of Frank Italiano, R-Camden.

Ex-Consul Attacked On Greece

Talbot, former U.S. Ambassador to Greece, told a gathering of 50 people yesterday that the U.S. does not in any way support the present military regime in Greece, but he failed to convince a handful of impassioned Greek students and supporters in the audi-

Speaking at Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School, Talbot, after finishing a 45 minute speech on "Problems in Greece," was peppered by a variety of questions. doubts and accusations from the small group which in-cluded several Greeks.

Questions Fired Talbot, currently president of The Asian Society, was the U.S. Ambassador in Greece from 1965 to 1967, when an April 27 coup led to the establishment of a miltary junta headed by Premier George

The irate students charged that the U.S. is supporting the Greek military regime with arms and that it was responsible for the junta's rise to power.

"We are a key factor in holding up the military junta in Greece at the present." a young female member of the audience said. "How can you deny that we supply the junta with power?'

One student even charged that Talbot himself because of his position at the time, was most responsible for the suc-

cess of the coup.
Talbot claimed repeatedley that he had had no knowledge of the coup before it took place, and as far as the military regime being supported by the U.S. "It just simply isn't so." he said.

Describing the present regime as "ideologically imprecise," the former ambassador maintained that it is in our interest that Greece move towards a more roadly based government. but that we are in no position to intervene in their affairs.
