The New Law Judge—Militia Matters—Fire and Police News.

The annual inspection of the Sixth Regiment N. G. of N. J., will take place at Burlington on the 16th of May.

If the report that Governor Green has decided to appoint Dr. Charles G. Garrison, of Camden, to succeed Judge John W. Wescott as law judge of the county be true, it will be received by the greater portion of the citizens of Camden as a wise selection on the part of his Excellency. Dr. Garrison comes from one of the oldest families in New Jersey; he is 39 years old. In 1871 he graduated from the University of Pennsylvania as a physician, but soon tiring of that life, he entered the law office of Samuel H. Gray in 1871, and graduated with high honors four years later. Mr. Garrison has made for himself one of the best law practices in New Jersey.
