CLAUDIUS BRADSHAW DEAD He Was Twice Elected Mayor of Camden Claudius W. Braushaw, former Mayor of Camden, dled soddenly last evening at his home, 520 South Second street, Canden, of heart fallure. He had been suffering for a long time from Bright's disease, which weakened his heart. He was critically ill during the past winter, and his life was several times despaired of. He railled about two months ago, and was able to ap-pear on the street, but about a week ago he was again confined to the bouse. Claudius W. Bradshaw was born at Shof-field, England, October 25, 1825. He came to this country with his parents in 1840. and three years later they removed to Camden. Young Bradshaw gained his education in the public schools, and learned the trade of a wood turner. He became an active member of Independence Fire Company, and in 1870 was elected City Marshal on the Democratic ticket. In 1871 the city charter was revised, and there was a deadlock to City Countil. The Democrats and Republicans each having elected an equal number of Councilmen. The folan equal number of councilment. In the lowing year the Legislature provided for the election of a Councilman at-Large, and Mr. Bradshaw was nominated by the Deniorats and elected. When he broke the Councilmanic deadlock he was presented with a key four feet long. In 1876 Mr. Jiradshaw was elected Chief of the Fire Department. He was bret elected Maror of the city in 1880, when he defected Benjamin F. Archer, Republi-cen. He was opposed for re-election by Dr. H. H. Davis, whom he easily defeated by over 1800 majority. He was a candidate for a third term, but was defeated by Jesse Pratt. He served as a member of the County Excise Roard in 1993, and was a

member of both the City and County Democratic Executive Committees at the time

of his death.
