

OVER IN CAMDEN

Mayor Hatch last evening appointed Samuel Paul, of the First ward, a sub-policeman.

Captain Washington Irving, commander of the Battalion of the East, Naval Reserve, last evening conducted an official inspection and muster of the Battalion of the West at the Masonic Temple. There were 110 men present, but many were without uniforms.
