Council Proceedings

Manley-Let as a School Site Received But Three Votes.

CITY TEAM DRIVERS' SALARIES INCREASED.

All members were present at the meeting of Council last evening. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A communication was received from the City Solicitor, enclosing two copies of sewer bonds drawn by the Treasurer and Solicitor. The form of bond was referred to the Finance Committee, who later approved same and Mr. Burke moved that the form be adopted. Carried.

The Solicitor also gave as his opinion that the City cannot legally return the sewer assessment on Curtis avenue but does not state that the assessment is correct as made in the first instance. The communications were received and filed.

A communication was also received from the Solicitor in regards to the ownership of the property known as the Presbyterian grave yard and up to the present time has been unable to find the name of owner, but will make a further search.

Mr. Cattell moved that the Street Committee be instructed to curb and gutter all properties on the south side of High street. Carried.

Mr. Cattell found that it will require \$700 to remove the obstruction on Aberdeen Place. This amount the committee thinks excessive and they asked that the matter be continued in their hands.

The Street Committee was also instructed to pave, curb, and gutter on the north side of Curtis avenue, with the exception of the Clement property, the owners of which have already made arrangements for their paving.

On motion of Mr. Cattell the City Solicitor was instructed to apply to the Court for the appointment of Commissioners to proceed to the condemning of the Salem Turnpike within the city limits.

A communication was received from the City Solicitor in the matter of title to land where the Robert Allen property on Carpenter street encroaches on the street. The Solicitor stated that it would be necessary to run a line according to the original lines, as when land becomes property of the City it remains as such.

Mr. Cattell moved that the City Surveyor in conjunction with the Street Committee draft an ordinance for Wood street, conforming with the original lines laid out and on file in the County Clerk's office in 1850. Carried.

A DIME NOVEL CHASE

Through Woods and Fields Went Constables After Their Man

During the heavy rain Monday afternoon John S. Smith, a Camden county detective, and John Shone, a constable, had an exciting two hours' chase through the woods at Blackwood, after Russell Neill, who was wanted on charge of assault and battery and threatening to kill Howard Lummie.

The latter is conductor on the Atlantic City Railroad. Because he refused to permit a man who had had too much hard cider to be on his train at Blackwood on Sunday night, Lummie says that Neill shoved a revolver in his face and snatched the ticket two, and refused to go off.

The case was reported to the Prosecutor's office and Smith and Shone were sent to arrest Neill. He got wind of their coming and took to the woods. They followed and then the chase in the thick underbrush began.

The pursuers frequently caught a glimpse of the fugitive and finally captured him. He was armed with a big knife and at first offered resistance, but was soon subdued.

A fine, a Justice of the Peace at Blackwood, committed Neill without bail to await the action of the Grand Jury.

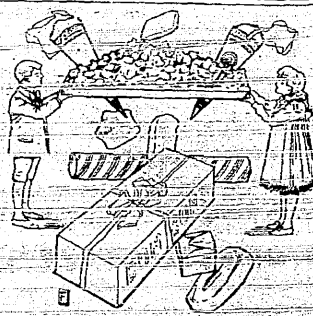
