

ONE WEEK MORE OF CAMPAIGNING

Republican Ticket Will Sweep Camden County With a Big Majority

Democrats, Hopeless of Success, Are Having a Factional Fight on the Side

With the end of this week the campaign in Camden county will practically end. During the week the Republican spellbinders will visit the Ninth and Twelfth wards, Camden, and Waterford and Winslow townships. Everything points to an overwhelming Republican majority.

While the Democrats have been taking but little interest in the campaign, the nomination of an independent Democratic ticket by the county Democracy will result in bringing out many Democrats to vote who otherwise would remain at home. Gottlieb Mick, chairman of the Executive Committee of the County Democracy, yesterday announced the appointment of the following Campaign Committee:

Lippincott, Thomas Wentz, Sr. The committee will endeavor to get out a larger vote for the County Democracy ticket than the "regular" faction of the party will poll. The regulars have William J. Thompson as their leader, with County Detective John S. Smith as his chief lieutenant, and they expect to down the "silk stockings."

A change was made in the County Democracy ticket yesterday, caused by the withdrawal of George Williams, of the Twelfth ward, as a candidate for the Assembly. The vacancy was filled by selecting Charles C. Old, of Pensauken township, who filed his acceptance with the County Clerk. Mr. Old is a shoe merchant in business in Philadelphia.

Jacob C. Daubman, who recently filed a certificate of nomination as an "Independent Republican" candidate for Sheriff yesterday, announced his withdrawal. He had made a strong play for the County Democracy indorsement, but failed to land it, and this left him no ground to stand on.

Political Straws

Major William H. Tee, of the First ward, who has been in City Council, would like to occupy his old seat again, and will be a candidate for the Republican nomination in the First ward next spring.

The Republican County Executive Committee yesterday arranged for the appointment of two challengers in each election district.

The Democratic County Executive Committee of the "regulars" organized yesterday afternoon by the election of Clarence T. Atkinson as chairman; James Burke, secretary, and Thomas Bodell. Committees were appointed to carry on campaign work.

There is no more popular candidate on the Republican ticket than Editor F. F. Patterson, Jr., who is receiving many voluntary pledges of support from Democrats.
