** For cutting William Crawford with a knife, Frank Johnson, a negro, was yesterday sentenced by Judge Joline to from one to three years at hard labor in the State Prison.

** Stricken with a heart attack shortly after returning home from a moving picture show, Mrs. Margaret Davis, aged 31 years, wife of Webster C. Davis, of 545 Roberts street, died yesterday.

** Playing on the lot at Twenty-first and Federal streets, children yesterday found the body of a new born babe. Coroner Bentley gave a certificate of death from natural causes.

** The slot gas meter in the Grace Baptist Church was looted by thieves early yesterday morning.

** A bullet from a revolver with which he was playing at his home yesterday tore a hole clear through the left hand of 11-year-old Wallace Carson, son of Contractor W. Penn Carson, of 530 Newton avenue, entering in the palm and coming out the back. The wound was dressed at Cooper Hospital.

** A gold pin and locket and a child's hank containing \$15 were stolen by a sneak thief from the residence of Lawyer Samuel T. French, 540 Vine street.

** Struck by a heavy plank which fell from a crane at the Dialogue ship yards, John Schulte, aged 26 years, of 1212 Thurman street, and Charles Mufler, aged 33 years, of 1103 Haddon avenue, were injured about the head and hands. Both were taken to Cooper Hospital.

** Fines ranging from \$100 to \$200 were imposed yesterday by Judge Joline on the eight Gloucester City saloonkeepers who pleaded non vult to charges of selling liquor on Sunday. Jennv Hirst, Harry Moss, Kate Lancaster, Peter A. Doyle and Harry Colma, first offenders, were let off with a fine of \$100 each.
