CAMDEN BAR WELCOMES NEW DISTRICT JUDGE

William C. French Is Succeeded by
Garfield Pancoast — Announces
Appointment of Attaches

District Court Judge Garfield Pancoast was sworn into office yesterday by Deputy County Clerk Howard Trux in Camden. In connection with the ascending of the new jurist to the bench, most of the Camden County bar was present to give him welcome and bid farewell to Judge William C. French, who completed five years of service yesterday.

There was a splendid display of floral tributes both to the new and the retiring judge. The little daughter of Judge Pancoast's, Dorothy, was carried to the bar with a basket containing rose buds and sweet peas. When the judge took her in his arms and kissed her, there was applause.

At the close of some speaking, Judge Pancoast announced the appointment of Clifford K. Deacon, a Councilman from the Tenth ward, as sergeant-at-arms, and Eldred I. Hibbs, of the Sixth ward, as assistant clerk. They will assume office May 1.

PACIFIST RESIGNS

Employees Refuse to Work With Un-
patriotic Man

Because Samuel Griffith, 31 years old, of 449 Henry street, refused to contribute toward a flag fund being raised at the Paviour car shops of the Pennsylvania, East Camden, where he was employed, there was a demonstration that threatened to assume serious proportions. Griffith was threatened with violence until the foremen interfered. The men refused to work with him and at the foreman's suggestion Griffith resigned.

PROWLER SENTENCED

Railway Men Investigate Supposed
Attempt to Dynamite Train

Taken to the office of Chief of Police Gravenor in Camden yesterday, John Daly, of 219 Elm street, who says he saw a man acting suspiciously about the elevated tracks of the West Jersey and Seashore Railroad at Newton avenue and Carteret street Wednesday night after which a 4-inch tunnel, 8 feet long was found alongside one of the girders, declared he had made no mistake. Railroad officials were inclined to scout the idea that an attempt had been made to plant some dynamite to blow up the powder train that passes through Camden to Communipaw every night, but Daly was positive that he had seen the mysterious individual at work and that he carried beneath his arm a bundle of cylindrical objects wrapped in paper.

The railroad men who made a thorough investigation yesterday said the hole might have been caused by recent rains, although an official said it might also have been bored by some tool. The railroad is being closely guarded by special officers of the company who took charge after a squad of the Second Regiment, N. G. N. J., had spent the night in vigil.

Robert Lacrosse, 48 years old, of 1291 North Sixth street, Philadelphia, was placed under arrest by Henry, a policeman, who found him prowling about the big coke works at the foot of Walnut street. Lacrosse said he meant no harm, but Recorder Stackhouse gave him a month in jail.

Nine Enlist in Camden

That the Eddystone disaster has resulted in a boom in enlistments at the Camden recruiting station, was shown yesterday when nine youths entered the service. This is a larger number than has enlisted for many days, and has greatly encouraged Corporal Arthur Carrier, who has been trying to entice the young men of Camden. He said three of the recruits had declared they were prompted to enlist wholly through the explosion at Eddystone.

Man Believed Demented Is Held

While members of the family of Frederick Reuling, of 1257 Kenwood avenue, Camden, were upstairs yesterday, they detected smoke. When they investigated they found a man in the living room before papers which were burning. He gave the name of William Lucas, 23 years old, of 121 North Tenth street. The police believe he is deranged.
