

GOVERNOR ENDS DISPUTE IN N. J. NATIONAL GUARD

Units of 17th Infantry Brigade Are Reallocated to Original Status

TRENTON, June 10.—Through an executive order just issued by Governor Edwards the several units of the Fifty-seventh Infantry Brigade, National Guard, which were moved from South Jersey to North Jersey, are reallocated to their original status, thus ending a grave situation which confronted the military organization of the State. Colonel Winfield S. Price, of Camden, will be in command of the One Hundred and Fourteenth Infantry. He will be assisted by Lieutenant Colonel Edward B. Stone, of Burlington.

The Governor's order, it is believed, will terminate the controversy over the election of Brigadier General Howard S. Borden, of Oceanic, as commandant of the Fifty-seventh Brigade. Borden was elected over a World War veteran at the reported dictation of Governor Edwards and so great was the dissatisfaction among veterans that more than two score of officers, including Price and Stone, resigned. The Legislature passed the Powell bill reorganizing the National Guard by restoring the Fifty-seventh Brigade units to the status they occupied before Borden shifted them about. The Governor vetoed the bill, but it was passed over his veto.
