

Tug Jamestown Is Lost at Sea.

Engulfed by an Immense Wave,
She Went Down Like a Shot,
Carrying 10 Persons.

Norfolk, Va., March 8.—(Special.)—The tug Jamestown, of Philadelphia, with a steam dredge in tow, went to the bottom with all on board in the storm of last Thursday. The tug was on the way to Philadelphia with the dredge when the storm encountered, raged with such fury that the tug had to cut the tow line and was moving about the dredge, giving instructions to those aboard, when an enormous wave engulfed the tug in a moment, and she went down like a shot. Ten persons were lost, including, Capt. William H. Cannon, assistant superintendent of the American Dredging Company; James E. Boen, captain of the tug, Thomas Crump, chief engineer, Second Engineer Samuel Fowler, all of Camden. All leave large families.

Pilot Phillips, of Philadelphia, Mate Coulterson, Firemen Shingle and Cook and two sailors, the survivors on the dredge, were rescued by the German steamer Albano, which lost her second mate overboard in the work of rescue.
