

TAXI DRIVER KILLED UNDER TROLLEY CAR

Crushed Beneath Rear
Trucks After His Motor
Stalls at Merchantville

Train Kills Boy and Injures
His Chum in Mysterious Ac-
cident Near Delair

Falling under the rear trucks of a trolley car at Merchantville, N. J., Edward Cummings, 23 years old, a taxicab operator, was fatally injured early yesterday morning.

The lower part of his body was mangled and it was necessary to jack up the car to extricate him. He died in Cooper Hospital, Camden, shortly after being admitted. Cummings lived at 106 North Second street, Camden, where a wife and four-year-old son, Harold, survive him.

Cummings had had engine trouble and after being towed tried again to repair the motor. His car was standing on Maple avenue, close to the trolley tracks. William Slimm, the motorman, heard a jolt as his car passed the stalled taxi. He stopped and investigated, discovering Cummings' body wedged under the trucks. Coroner Holl believes Cummings tripped over the towing cable and plunged under the rear trucks after the front of the car had passed him.

Train Kills Boy At Delair

His skull and legs crushed when struck by a train at Delair, Sunday night, Thomas Bova, 17 years old, of Delair, died yesterday at Cooper Hospital, Camden.

Lewis Toll, 16 years old, injured at the same time, has concussion of the brain and other injuries. He will recover.

Although none of the crews of the trains passing through Delair have knowledge of an accident, there is no doubt but that the two boys were hit by a train while they walked along the tracks. They were found by David Saltzman, a towerman, who heard their moans, shortly after a Trenton local train passed through.

Charged with homicide for the killing of Clinton R. Roberts, colored, who he caught robbing the henery at his home, Antonio Speer, 38 years old, of 1209 South Eighth street, was yesterday held without bail by Recorder Stackhouse. The complaint was made by Captain of Detectives Schregler. Speer admitted that he shot Roberts and said he fired when he feared the negro would attack him. Supreme Court Justice Katzenbach will be asked to admit Speer to bail.
