

KILLED BY A COBBLE STONE.

A Camden Lad Dies from Blows Inflicted by a Playmate.

Sixteen-year-old Frank Connelly, living at 1813 Fillmore street, died early yesterday morning under peculiar circumstances. Some time ago, while playing with some other companions, he was hit on the head with a cobble stone by one of the lads. Although the wound caused the lad considerable pain, he paid very little attention to it. The result was that an abscess formed and finally resulted in his death. Young Connelly was apparently well when he went to bed on Saturday night. When his father went to call him yesterday morning he found him lifeless. County Physician Izard was notified, and will make an official investigation.

HE DRANK POISON.

Frank Rawson, who said he lived at No. 58 Market street, was admitted to the Cooper Hospital yesterday. He was found on the street in a dazed condition. At the hospital the physicians treated him for vertigo. When he recovered consciousness he admitted that he had drank laudanum. The doctors then applied the necessary remedies, which were instrumental in saving the man's life. Rawson denied that he drank the drug with suicidal intent.

A WELL-KNOWN MAN DEAD.

James Kennedy, Sr., of 630 Walnut street, one of the oldest Democrats in Camden, died yesterday of catarrh. The deceased was 75 years of age. When the division lines of the various wards were changed some time ago Mr. Kennedy was the first one to represent the Seventh ward in City Council. He was also at one time a member of the Board of Freeholders, and served two terms in the Board of Education.
