

WOODWARD'S NERVE FAST LEAVING HIM

Paul Woodward will be hanged at the Camden County Jail this morning, shortly after 10 o'clock, by Sheriff Mines, for the murder of two boys. Unless he regains his wonted nonchalance he will undoubtedly create a scene.

The condemned youth arose yesterday early, ate a hearty breakfast and read the newspapers. Then he whiled away the morning by playing popular airs on his harmonica.

When the dinner hour approached he said:

"Well, this will be my last dinner. It's up to me to eat and I want my favorite dish. It's rabbit."

He enjoyed his meal with evident relish.

In the afternoon Rev. John Warnock, his spiritual adviser, visited him. Woodward listened to the clergyman with rather a bored expression.

Later his mother, father and two sisters took their farewell leave of the condemned youth. The women were much affected, the mother being supported from the jail. After his relatives had gone Woodward nonchalantly smoked a cigar and began reading a novel. Then he gave several selections on his harmonica.

Last night his appetite was as keen as ever. After his meal the doomed youth began to show the first signs of weakening. He sat in his hammock reading a prayer book. At times his lips trembled and his eyes filled with tears. This is the first evidence of emotion Woodward has shown.
