

CAMDEN CARS TO RUN ON SKIP-STOP SYSTEM

Council Gives Assent to Company to Start New Schedule On Wednesday

Camden trolley cars will tomorrow start operation on the skip-stop plan, many street intersection stations being cut out to save fuel. A letter from State Fuel Administrator Jenkinson to Mayor Ellis recommending the immediate establishment of the plan, was sent to the Street Committee of City Council. The letter was regarded as an order from the Government and the committee took the ground that the case was one for the railway alone to deal with. Accordingly the trolley company took steps to put the new plan in effect tomorrow.

Aged Woman Ejected

Given shelter by the police when she was found wandering aimlessly about the streets after being ejected from her room in a house at Fifth and Spruce streets, Mrs. Anna E. Cowgill, aged 80 years, told the police that she had two sons in South Camden who had been paying her room rent. The rent of the room has been advanced and as she did have the funds to meet the increase, she says she was ejected. Overseer of the Poor Rankins announced that steps will be taken to have the aged woman's relatives look after her.

Couple Held for Trial

Felonious Assault Charged

"Sure I did it," said Raffele Pasino, when arraigned before Recorder Stackhouse in Camden Police Court yesterday on a charge of murderously slashing his wife with a butcher knife. Detective Troncone informed the court that the attack was prompted by jealousy. The Recorder committed Pasino without bail. The police believe the prisoner is deranged.
